

May Day, May Day!

The beginning of May includes some odd holidays. May 1st on the church calendar is the Feast of the Apostles Philip and James (the Less), two disciples about whom little is known. Philip appears mostly in John's Gospel where he is disappointingly literal-minded about Jesus' message. "Show us the Father and we will be satisfied!" Philip demands, when Jesus tries to tell the group that he himself is the way to the Creator and eternal life. (A different Philip appears in Acts ch. 8, baptizing the Ethiopian official, as we heard last Sunday.)

About this particular James (one of three in the Gospels) we know even less. His moniker could mean "the younger" but for me "less" is apt, for it describes his memorable qualities! All we know is that he hung in there through all the controversial actions and mysterious teachings of Jesus, and for that he deserves recognition – less superhero than a model we might follow.

Of course, May Day has secular significance that is better known. In some countries today's the start of summer – halfway between the equinox in March and the solstice in June.And, it's International Workers' Day, a holiday first promoted by the labor movement in the late 19th century, when demonstrations and work stoppages took

place. Most of us remember the televised parades of large weapons and marching soldiers passing by state leaders in communist Moscow. Workers' marches still take place around the world –and this year, the rights of Palestinians are being added to some activists' placards, in solidarity with students demonstrating here in the US.

May 5, this coming Sunday, is of course "Cinco de Mayo," which is

NOT Mexican Independence Day (that being on Sept. 16); instead it marks the Battle of Puebla in 1862 when against the odds, the Mexican Army defeated French troops in their bid to reestablish an empire in North America. The US was



busy with our Civil War and couldn't assist the Mexican people (though we would, three years later, when US aid helped push out the French for good). The Battle of Puebla in 1862 prevented the French from continuing north to involvement in our terrible conflict, on the side of the Confederacy. Who knows how much the outcome might have changed? In California, celebrations of Mexican-American culture began to be observed in May 1862, when Mexicans mining for gold learned of their countrymen's victory and began to celebrate. So if you raise a glass of tequila or cerveza on May 5, do so for the right reasons!

Here at church, we'll observe May 5 as a time for healing, remembering all those whose rights and safety are in jeopardy as we ask God for wholeness in ourselves and loved-ones. I'm grateful that Mary Jo + will m'aidez! with the sacramental anointing during our 10:30 am. service. And as Kathy Kortge has already let you know: wear your working clothes (how appropriate), when our labors will be in the building and gardens for Clean Up Day!

I Hear You, God!

The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep listen to his voice.

John 10:3



Baby Graham fussed and wiggled as his mother held him in her lap while the doctors inserted his first hearing aid. Moments after the doctor turned on the device, Graham stopped crying. His eyes widened. He grinned. He could hear his mother's voice comforting him, encouraging him, and calling his name.

Baby Graham heard his mother speaking, but he needed help learning how to recognize her voice and understand the meaning of her words. Jesus invites people into a similar learning process. Once we accept Christ as our Savior, we become the sheep He knows intimately and guides personally (John 10:3). We can grow to trust and obey Him as we practice

hearing and heeding His voice (v. 4).

In the Old Testament, God spoke through the prophets. In the New Testament, Jesus—God in the flesh —spoke directly to people. Today, believers in Jesus have access to the power of the Holy Spirit, who helps us understand and obey God's words which He inspired preserved in the Bible. We can communicate directly with Jesus through our prayers as He speaks to us through Scripture and through His people. As we come to recognize God's voice, which is always in alignment with His words in the Bible, we can cry out with grateful praise, "I hear You, God!"

A team consisting of Paul Dolza, Bill Anderson and Doug Hill are working on specifications related to our Church roof and tower.






April Community Blood Drive


